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Sex vs. Gender

Sex:

"Refers to the biological differences between males and females, such as the genitalia and genetic differences"

Gender:

"Can refer to the role of a male or female in society, known as a gender role, or an individual's concept of themselves, or gender identity"

Impact of Gender Roles on Children and Development

✤ Career choices

- "Women do not pursue job paths within STEM and men do not hire them because neither group perceives those jobs to be appropriate for women" (Puchner, Markowitz, & Hedley, 2015, p. 24)
- ✤ Health concerns
 - "Dysfunctional behavior . . . lower self-esteem . . . depression and eating disorders, diminished cognitive efficiency" (Ward & Aubrey, 2017)
 - "Their anxiety is correlated with depression, binge drinking, and drug use" (Ward & Aubrey, 2017)

What influences these Gender Roles?

• Parents

- Have the strongest influence on children
- Pass on their own beliefs about gender
- Approval/Disapproval of children's gender expression
- Peers
 - Other children's reactions and comments at school
 - Gender divided play
- Television and Other Entertainment
 - Commercials targeted to specific genders
 - Ex: Barbie commercial only has girls playing
 - Presents many male and female stereotypes
 - Male's often outnumber females

Kohlberg's Cognitive Developmental Theory of Gender Three Stages

- 1. Gender Identity (2-3 years old)
 - a. Child recognizes that they are male or female and other people are as well, but fails to recognize that gender is "constant"
- 2. Gender Stability (3-7 years old)
 - a. Child knows that gender is "fixed"
 - b. "When I grow up I will be a mommy/daddy"
- 3. Gender Constancy (7-12 years old)
 - a. Child understands that gender does not change despite appearance or activities
